# Bio profiles

Ashima Sharma is a Consultant- Research and Documentation at Innovative Change Collaborative (ICCo), New Delhi. She is working for a project on eradication of child labour in India called Work: No Child's Business. She graduated with a major in journalism from Jindal School of Journalism and Communication. She is a recipient of the Graduate Research Immersion Programme (GRIP) Fellowship, 2020. She has interned with the BBC, Indian Express, Delhi and Times of India where she was reporting on the field covering the crime and city beat. She has been part of an annual art festival, ArtEast at the India International Centre, New Delhi where she has also exhibited installations covered by the national media. She has co-edited journals for India International Centre and Seminar. Her focus in research has been on refugees and migration, and has interned with an international film production researching on the Rohingyas. She also runs her own podcast called The Hook (https://thehook.podbean.com).

Minket Lepcha has been engaged with documenting stories and folklore based on ethnic communities of Darjeeling and Sikkim in India for few years. Having always been inspired by Lepcha folklore and believing that ecological widsom is hidden in these stories, she has created a workshop based on the folklore of Himalayan Communities. She has been invited as a mentor/facilitator for youth and women groups in North East of India and Bangladesh to support them with connecting with their rivers. She received The Third Pole-Oxfam Shared Water Media Grants as part of the Transboundary Rivers of South Asia (TROSA) project funded by the Government of Sweden, for a photo story on women of the Mahakali River. She has been a research fellow in Kathmandu Valley Urban History Project of Nepal Photo Circle and has recently collborated with Living Water Museum for 'Visualising Water Heritage through storytelling in North East India.' She is an awardee of Young Green Filmmaker 2016 at Woodpecker International Film Festival for her film 'Voices of Teesta'. This film also earned 10th position amongst 110 films at World Water Forum in Brazil 2018.

During her journalism career, she received accolades (awards and fellowship) for her remarkable work on acid violence, population control, tobacco control and also on gender based violence in Bangladesh.
